Call to Prayer

The Presbyterian Youth Movement calls us all to a special time of prayer for the youth of our country, **25 May** at 5pm for an hour.

Our Tamariki, our children, our rangatahi, our young people need a fresh revelation of God. They need freedom, a sense of belonging and a sense of worth grounded in our Creator.

They need peace and a sense of security, to be safe. They need to be loved well and to have healthy and life-giving connections.

They need a renewed sense of hope. They need laughter and joy. They need God.

They need all of these things to be louder than other voices, devices, noise, social media and news.

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On Earth as it is in Heaven

Tom Holland has written a book called "Dominion", which traces the impact that Christianity has had on the world we live in. He argues that, on a civilizational level we are all Christians, whether or not we believe Jesus was God. This is because Jesus and his followers changed civilization so much that it would be unrecognizable to the people who came before Christ. We all live in that inheritance now.

The Graeco-Roman world was savage. When an unwanted child was born, it would often be dumped in a sewer or drain and left to die. Slavery was pervasive and the head of the household had total rights over all of his property, whether that property was flesh and bone or not. He could abuse them because that was his right.

The gods of antiquity were a vicious and capricious breed who would happily intervene in the lives of men to inflict pain. One approached them with trepidation and fear.

Graeco-Roman rulers, meanwhile, were quite content to keep 'the plebeian classes' in servitude and poverty, as that was the natural order of things.

Entering into this milieu was a bizarre teacher from somewhere on the political fringes of Roman civilization. He lived in a way that is recognizable to people of the 21at century, but was different to the point of absurdity for citizens of the Roman Empire. What he did went on to change not just the Empire, but everything that has happened since.

I'm not sure I will ever fully grasp what a paradigm shift it was when Jesus spoke to those people of the intrinsic value of every life. It makes sense now, but did it then? Especially for a non-Jewish audience?

In time they came to understand that he was in fact God himself. And this was no volatile Roman god, no deified Caesar. He did not intervene in battle

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to bring victories; instead, he ministered to women who were forced into prostitution, people with disabilities, widows, and infants. His friends were no senators or philosophers; they were foul-mouthed smelly fishermen. Eventually he was subjected to the shame of crucifixion. He had not won a battle for or against the Empire; he had died as a man at the lowest rung of it. When this is how your God acts, how much does that change your approach to everything?

As Tom Holland explains, it is possible to trace the origins of modern human rights all the way back to how Jesus and his followers changed how we understand the value and freedom of each person.

We stand today in the legacy of a man who saw people, their anguish, their powerlessness, and their hope, and he acknowledged it. He made them feel loved in a society that said this was the last thing they should expect.

And this is not a love that he limits according to a person's power, their gender, their faith, their politics, their job, their sexuality, or even whether or not it is easy to like them! He looks at each person and sees someone he made; he sees someone he loves, someone longing to be loved.
